Treasurer's Report

2023 saw three full shows put on by the Players. The Showstoppers slot was replaced with **Kipps** which had been delayed from the previous year. The Autumn Show was **Anything Goes** and the Spring show was **Kinky Boots**. All three shows were a great successes from a production perspective and two of them earned the Players NODA certificates for both performance and programme design.

However, both Kipps and Anything Goes suffered from poor audience numbers and consequently lower ticket sales. This rendered both shows loss making. Thankfully, Kinky Boots went some way to remedy this position having made a surplus of just over £2.6k. Overall there was still a net deficit from shows in 2023 to the tune of (coincidentally) £2.6k.

Happily, non-show Income and Expenditure was good. Income from the hire and sales of costumes/props/microphones plus income from fund raising events (for example the ceilidh) was positive but could have been much higher with better patronage. Costs were lower as the prior year included tree work at the Studio. Also, some old creditor provisions were written off.

Overall 2023 reported a net surplus of £435 compared to a deficit of (£10,385) the year before.

In spite of a positive result, we nevertheless reported a downturn in cash reserves of circa £6k. A large part of this being the purchase of fixed assets. Cash is very important for 2024 as there is a high expense (up to £30k) for building works at the Studio which forms part of our lease obligation. So it is very important that:

- 1. We refresh our membership and maintain or increase numbers
- 2. Our members support the fund raising by attending shows and fundraising events
- 3. Members run their own initiatives or donate wherever possible in order to raise funds. A great example is from Robyn Davies who has already raised £300.00 from her BodyShop fundraising event and from the work that was set in motion by Fiona McGregor with TerraCycle.
- 4 Most important is that EVERYONE gets involved in this. Raising £25k for a small society such as ours is no small task and something that the committee can help to facilitate but not to do in isolation.

Therefore, we need the support and contribution of the whole membership to make it work.

We had a lovely time at the ANNUAL BBQ on 23 July and would like to extend our thanks to Susanna and Christopher Lloyd for being such generous hosts and Lizzie Hales for her fabulous entertainment. Following the AGM held on the same day we're delighted to welcome two new committee members, Jo Weller who will be taking the lead on our Fund Raising sub-committee, supported by Jane McMichael and Chloe Johnson-Jones who's been brave enough to step in to Pamela's shoes as secretary. Like many of you, I was surprised to see in the AGM notice that Pam had decided to step down (she'd kept it very quiet until the last moment!) after no less than 38 years in the role. Pam joined the society for Die Feldermaus in 1965 and continued her involvement throughout raising no less than 5 children, appearing in around 80 productions. Her beautiful soprano voice guaranteed her a solo spot in all our Music Halls and almost all our Show Stoppers productions. She's taken on numerous supporting roles over the years including Lady Boxington in My Fair Lady in 1975, Shandel in Fiddler in both 1976 and 1999, Sister Sophia in the 1993 production of The Sound of Music and her personal favourite, Nimue in Camelot in 1995. Her absolute staring role in recent years though was as The Queen on our Platinum Jubilee Float last year which without doubt stole the show. Pam has seen the society grow and change and has been our constant support throughout the last 38 years.

We also said farewell to Arran Treacher-Evans who's served on the committee for the last couple of years looking after social (not an easy task during the tail end of COVID) so thank you to Arran. Verity Foster will now pick up the reins on social, supported by Mary-Lou Knox and both the fund-raising and the social sub-committees will be looking for 2-3 additional members to join them.

You'll find a full list of committee members and other supporters elsewhere in the newsletter. Fund-raising and social are both hugely important to the society so please do get in touch if you'd like to be involved.

Those present at the AGM also voted to increase the adult acting membership and non-acting membership by £5 and to add a fund-raising levy to this year's annual subscription. Full details can be found elsewhere in the newsletter.

Preparations are also underway for **FOOTLOOSE** which has a great mix of older and younger roles and lots of dancing! The presentation evening for this will be on Tuesday 31 October at Shottermill Club led by Director Fiona McGregor, MD Justin Luke and Choreographer Emma Lumb.


Please can we ask that you don't park at the studio unless you are there on Players business, unless this has been arranged in advance. This will help us to resolve the issue.

Footloose the Musical

Haslemere Players are fortunate to have a fabulous lineup in store for 2024 and I am excited to bring to the stage our first offering in March 2024 - Footloose the Musical. What's the story?

After his dad walks out, Ren, a dance loving teen from Chicago, moves with his mother to the small town of Bomont to live with his Aunt and Uncle. Little does he know that the town, still grieving from untimely deaths of four of its youngsters in a car accident, has placed a ban on all music and dance.

The town pivots around the teachings of the church led by Reverend Moore whose words are taken as law. Unfortunately, his son was one of those lost in the accident. We journey through his grief and see how disconnected he has become from his loved ones. In particular, we see this through his wife Vi's pleas for acknowledgement and love. Despite fond memories of their past the couple are isolated from one another. Their daughter Ariel, an intelligent young woman, is testing her father's boundaries in a bid to reconnect to the person she once knew. This includes dating local bad boy Chuck Cranston, whom even her trio of friends Rusty, Urleen and Wendy Jo are wary of.

The trio act in many ways as narrators through-out the show providing much needed light and humour. They are often seen alongside their male counterparts who bring flashes of mischief and energy to their roles helping to weave a sense of normality into the town as well as highlighting everyone's desperation for expressive freedom.

Ren feels frustrated by the restrictive lifestyle and finds himself in trouble at every corner. He is strong willed and finds it challenging to be contained after growing up in the city. This restlessness helps him to catch the eye of Ariel. They start spending more time together, working through their respective grief and ultimately, they fall in love.

Ren's persistence, coupled with Ariel's intelligence, helps them eventually to break down Reverend Moore's objections. He can see that whilst he has been trying to guide everyone around him, his own grief has affected his judgement and he has lost himself along the way. By laying down the burden of grief he remembers that his job is to help people find joy in their lives. In a bid to bring life back into the community he approves the High School dance.

Despite the starting point of this show being that of great sadness, the story-line alongside the vibrant music and (secretive) dancing is a joyous reminder that we are resilient and that together we can find forgiveness and happiness again.
